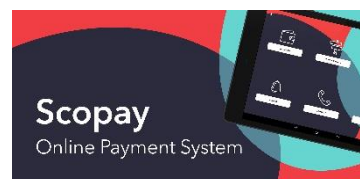

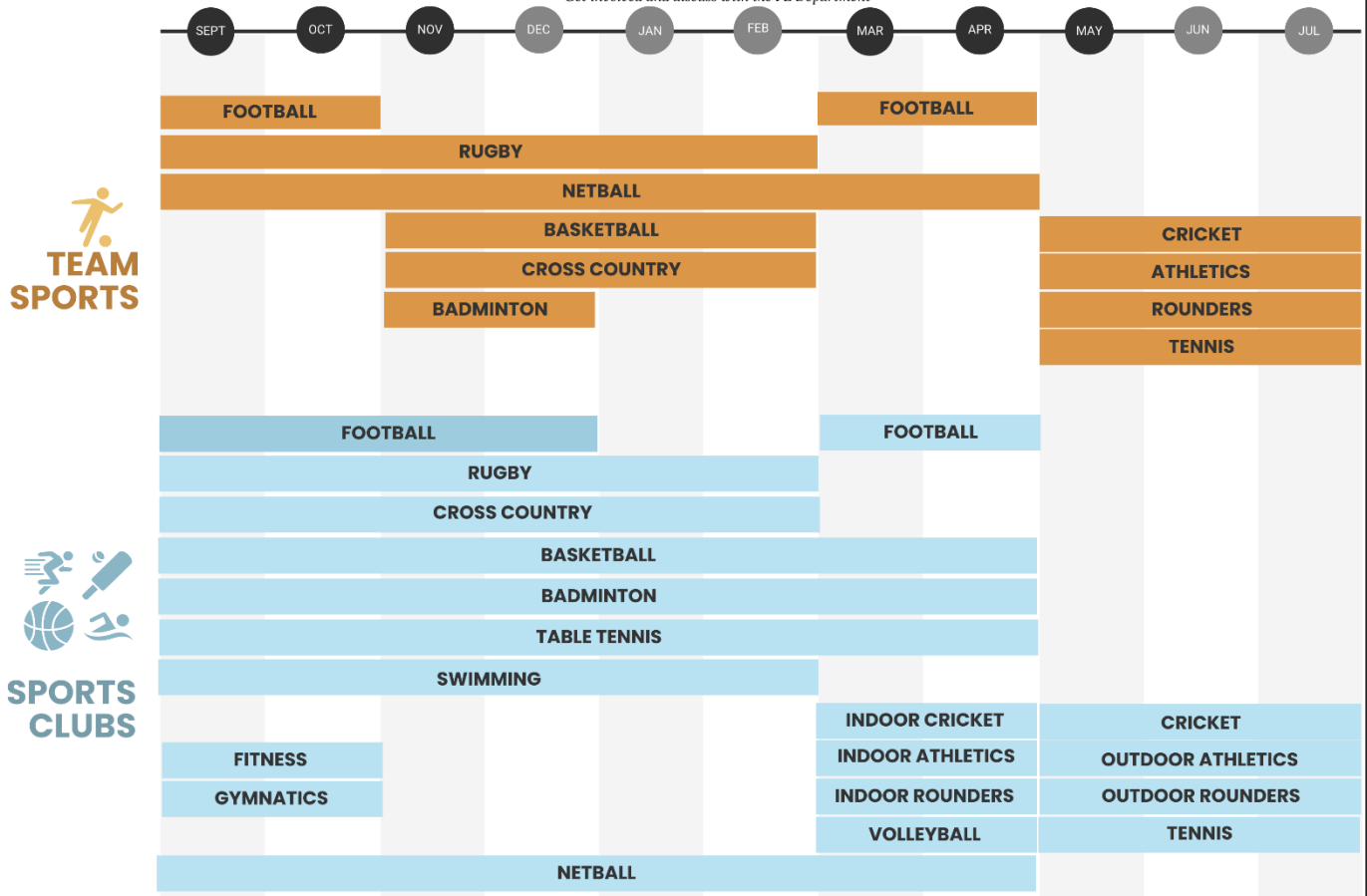

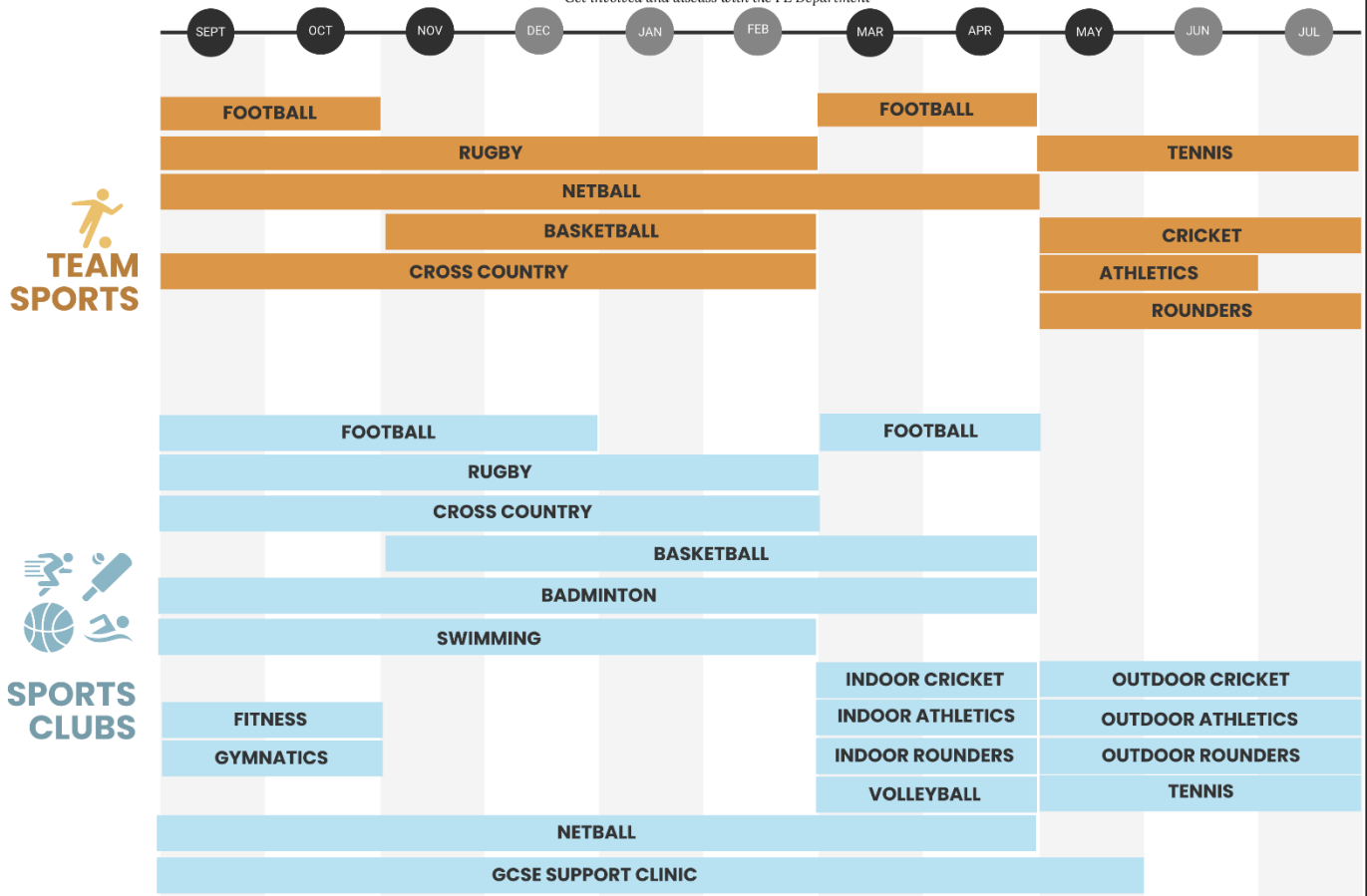

YATELEY SCHOOL CURRICULUM: SEPTEMBER-26

All students study a broad curriculum on a fortnightly pattern in Years 7–8, move into deeper study in Year 9 and then specialise through a blend of GCSE options and core subjects in Years 10–11.

• Exploring the Gothic Tradition: Stories and Poems: Where did the scary story come from? How does a writer hint at horror and can you bring alive the supernatural? How can vivid stories be brought to life on the page? • Literature of Other Cultures - Of Mice and Men: Is the American Dream available to all? What is true friendship and can you measure it? What about inappropriate racial terms and sexist terms – why are they used? The appropriacy of language. • Non-fiction Reading and Writing - Is fake news leaving us all confused about what is real and what isn't? This unit takes a close look at how the language of fact and opinion are presented throughout a variety of non-fiction texts. • Animal farm – How can language be used for persuasion? And, if in the wrong hands, how far can the power of language change whole societies. • Modern Drama and WW1 poetry- Journey's End: How does an audience experience a play? Does a writer's experience always influence their writing and can you understand their purpose? How do character and theme communicate deeper messages about society? How is this theme used in Poetry? Is it similar or different in different poem? Do you know your poetry techniques?	1. Visit Yateley Library or charity/book shops to find reading material that both you and your child enjoy and can share the pleasure of reading. 2. Reading is still a necessity and should be encouraged beyond what they may have lying around from Primary school – reading improves vocabulary – this is not English specific. 3. Show awareness that language has power - engage in conversations with your child to discuss how the intent of certain vocabulary choices and imagery can impact its audience. This might be discussing the ideas presented in a work of fiction or discussing the language choices in an advert or news article. 4. Number: How can we solve increasingly complex problems with fractions, percentages and standard form? How do money, rates and proportional reasoning help us make informed decisions in everyday life? Algebra: How can equations, graphs and algebraic expressions help us model real situations? How do patterns, formulae and mathematical proof help us explain and justify our thinking? Geometry: How can we calculate lengths, areas, surface areas and volumes? How do transformations, constructions, congruency and Pythagoras' Theorem help us solve geometric problems? Ratio and proportion: How can ratio, scale and similarity help us compare quantities? What happens when values are directly or inversely proportional? How can we use rates to solve real-world problems? Data: How can probability help us predict outcomes? How do graphs and statistical information help us interpret data and make informed decisions?	1. Encourage your child to explain their reasoning when solving problems, rather than focusing only on the final answer. This develops confidence and mathematical thinking. 2. Look for opportunities to use maths in everyday life, such as budgeting, comparing prices, reading graphs in the media or calculating distances, speeds and percentages. These practical examples help reinforce classroom learning. 3. Encourage regular, short bursts of practice using a suitable revision app or online platform rather than one long session, especially in the run-up to assessments.

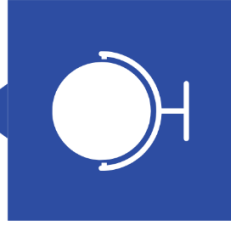
